Can It Wait 'Til 8?

The new time of use rate, effective in April, makes using energy after 8 pm worth the wait.

Effective with April's usage and reflected in May's statements, Hendricks Power is implementing a new time of use rate. The new rate reduces On Peak hours to 5-8 pm on weeknights. This update betters reflects the cost of wholesale power, which fluctuates throughout the day and is most expensive for Hendricks Power to purchase during On Peak times

Using energy before 5 pm and after 8 pm, during Off Peak times, can save members significantly. The rate per kWh nearly doubles from 5-8 pm, so if you can, wait 'til 8 pm! Waiting to wash dishes, do laundry, or take showers, will reduce your monthly bill. Below are a few easy changes you can make in your home to reduce your On Peak usage and save money on your next statement!

TRY:
Waiting until 8 pm and using the cold water setting
Preheating or cooling your home before 5 pm
Schedule your dishwasher to run after 11 pm
Wait until closer to bedtime, after 8 pm
Schedule charging between 11 pm and 5 am














APPRECIATING OUR

NATIONAL WORK ZONE AWARENESS WEEK IS APRIL 17-21. BE MINDFUL OF LINEWORKERS ON THE JOB.

Work zones also include utility crews who work along the roadsides to build, repair and maintain the highway of electric power lines.

When motorists see the orange diamond-shaped work zone warning signs and vehicles with flashing amber lights, they should slow down and prepare for the zone ahead.

Indiana law requires motorists to approach cautiously and change lanes away from the emergency vehicles if they can do so safely. If not, they should reduce their speed to 10 mph under the posted speed limit and proceed with caution.

Emergency vehicles protected by the law include:

- Police vehicles
- Ambulances
- Fire trucks and rescue equipment
- Highway incident-response vehicles
 Tow tru
- Highway maintenance vehicles
- Utility service vehicles

Violating the law can result in a fine and a suspended license. Steeper penalties, including jail time, are enforced for infractions within work zones.

Though move-over laws are only for emergency vehicles, drivers should always be courteous to those parked on the shoulder. Give them room to safely repair their vehicles and help prevent tragedies.

Energy Efficiency Tip of the Month

This planting season, include energy efficiency in your landscaping plans. Adding shade trees around your home can reduce surrounding air temperatures as much as 6 degrees. To block heat from the sun, plant deciduous trees around the south side of your home. Deciduous trees provide excellent shade during the summer and lose their leaves in the fall and winter months, allowing sunlight to warm your home.
