Hendricks Power is proud to announce recent contributions that strengthen families, youth programs, and community spaces throughout its service area.

As part of its ongoing commitment to community well-being, Hendricks Power donated \$2,000 to Project ANGEL of Hendricks County.

Project ANGEL provides essential holiday assistance to families in need, including food baskets, warm clothing, and holiday gifts for children.

This donation will help ensure that local families can enjoy a joyful holiday season, despite financial hardships.

Through its Operation Round Up program, funded by voluntary donations from Hendricks Power members who "round up" their monthly utility bills, Hendricks Power also contributed \$3,000 to the Cascade Fire Cadet Program. This program introduces students in 7th-12th grade to firefighting and emergency medical services (EMS), combining hands-on training, mentorship from local firefighters, and educational opportunities. The program not only prepares young people for potential careers in public safety but also teaches leadership, teamwork, and community responsibility.

Operation Round Up also donated \$2,000 to the B&O Trail Association. These funds will support landscaping and beautification efforts around the recently paved and improved parking lot at the Tilden Trailhead on County Road 500 East. This investment enhances the trail experience for residents and visitors, encouraging more outdoor activity and enjoyment of local recreational spaces.

Where Your Energy Dollar Goes: Building a Reliable System You Can Count On

4 Tips to Reduce Energy Usage This Winter Without Sacrificing Comfort

Winter in Indiana brings colder weather, shorter days, and higher energy use. Hendricks Power is here to help you stay warm, comfortable, and energy-smart with these tips.

1. Thermostat Settings

- \cdot 68°F while you're home and awake
- · 60-65°F while you're away or asleep

If you have a heat pump, avoid large setbacks (more than 3–4 degrees) to prevent energy-heavy auxiliary heat. A smart or programmable thermostat can help manage this automatically.

2. Phantom Loads

Some of these devices use power even when turned off.

- · Game consoles
- $\boldsymbol{\cdot}$ TVs and sound systems
- · Chargers left plugged in
- $\boldsymbol{\cdot}$ Coffee makers and countertop appliances with digital displays

Tip: Unplug devices when not in use, or plug groups of electronics into a power strip so you can turn them all off with one switch.

3. Affordable Insulation improvements

- $\boldsymbol{\cdot}$ Weatherstrip doors and windows
- Install door sweeps
- · Cover drafty windows with clear plastic film kits
- · Add foam outlet gaskets behind switch plates on exterior walls
- · Use insulated curtains at night
- · Seal gaps around pipes, attic doors, and vents

4. Humidity Levels

Dry air makes your home feel cooler. Adding a little humidity helps rooms feel warmer at lower thermostat settings. Aim for 30–50% humidity.

- · Use a humidifier
- · Add plants
- · Air-dry small laundry loads
- · Leave bathroom doors open after showers

As a member-owned electric cooperative, Hendricks Power is focused on delivering safe, reliable power by continually investing in the system that serves you—often behind the scenes.

Strengthening the Poles That Hold It All Together

One of the key ways we enhance reliability is through our pole replacement program. In 2025, we replaced 700 poles, proactively preventing outages by identifying and renewing aging or damaged infrastructure.

Smarter Technology for Faster Restoration

We continue investing in feeder automation technology that detects problems, isolates faults, and reroutes power. In many cases, this technology can restore service in seconds, reducing outage time and improving the overall member experience.

New automated devices are being added to overhead lines, with installations beginning on underground circuits.

Overhead-to-Underground Improvements

We are advancing overhead-to-underground conversions in areas with limited access, heavy vegetation, and aging equipment. In 2025, we completed 11 projects, with 15 more budgeted for 2026.

Substations Built for the Future

Substations are critical to safe, efficient power delivery. We completed construction on the new Vandalia Substation, making it fully operational, earlier this year. We've also begun early design work on the Whitaker Substation in Plainfield, which should be completed by the end of 2027 or the beginning of 2028.

Upgrades are underway at the Montclair, Plainfield West, and Plainfield South substations to strengthen infrastructure, improve communication, and increase system flexibility.
